


## Cal-IPC Background

- Formed 1992, nonprofit status granted 1993
- First 10 years, no staff, run solely by BOD. Annual budget \$20,000.
- Core functions:
  - Annual Symposium
  - Quarterly newsletter
  - Weed list

#### Cal-IPC with staff

- In 2002, ED hired half-time.
- Now have 3 full-time staff:
  - Executive Director
  - Project Manager
  - Outreach Associate
- Office shared with other groups.
- Annual budget \$400,000.

## Cal-IPC funding - \$400,000



#### Cal-IPC solidified core work

- Annual Symposium, 400 attendees.
- Quarterly newsletter on schedule.
- Revised weed list (Inventory)
- Membership database
- Website

## Cal-IPC new project areas

- Advocacy at state and national levels.
- Field courses for weed workers.
- Projects (grant funded):
  - Mapping consortium
  - Risk assessment
  - Nursery collaboration
  - Technical publications

#### Cal-IPC collaboration

#### Other NGOs:

- Joint m'ship with CNGA, SERCAL.
- Advocacy with Farm Bureau, etc.
- Nursery collaboration with SusCon.

#### Industry:

- Nursery and landscape trades.
- Restoration business sponsors.

#### Cal-IPC collaboration, cont'd

- Gov't agencies
  - USDA ARS for development of biocontrols
  - Caltrans, USFWS for mapping Saharan mustard
  - USGS, Joint Fire Science, CIPM on fire report
- WMAs
  - Led advocacy for renewed state funding at \$1.5M


## Cal-IPC looking forward

- Mapping at landscape scale.
- Risk assessment protocol:
  - Horticultural trade
  - Funding
  - Biosecurity policy
- Grow weed worker capacity.
  - Funding
  - Training
  - Coordination

## Georgia EPPC

- Formed 1999, with hiatus. No staff.
- Under Southeast-EPPC umbrella.
- 100 members, budget \$2,000.
- No formal conference, newsletter, or list (meetings twice a year).
- Main activity: Giving workshops— 200 trainees in last 2 years.

## GA-EPPC funding - \$2,000




#### **IPA** of Wisconsin

- Formed 2001, 501c3 status.
- PT staff for admin, website.
- 200 dues-paying members, plus.
- Annual conference (with others).
- Quarterly newsletter, book.
- Website, listserv.
- Weed list.

#### **IPAW** extras

- Seat on Governor's Invasive Species Council.
- Board representation includes head of state nursery assn., etc.
- Speakers' bureau, lots of PPTs and associated materials.
- Active website, with alerts, etc.

## **IPAW funding - \$20,000**




#### Midwest IPN

- Formed 2002, pursuing 501c3.
- Housed by The Nature Conservancy.
- One FT staff = Coordinator.
- Annual conference, quarterly newsletter.
- Tight relationship with EPPCs in region, agencies, TNC.


#### MIPN extras

- Conduct trainings on forming CWMAs in effort to boost capacity.
- Produce a range of publications:
  - CWMA cookbook for eastern states.
  - Landscaping alternatives brochure.
  - Weeds 101 brochure.
  - Field guide.

- "Small" (GA-EPPC) –members
- "Medium" (IPAW) members + private grants
- "Regional" (MIPN) donations + gov't grants
- "Large" (Cal-IPC) members + donations + events + private + gov't grants

#### **Function levels**

- 1. Conference, newsletter, website
- 2. Trainings, list, enhanced website, basic outreach publications
- 3. Advocacy, research coordination, technical publications

### Why (re)form a PNW-EPPC?

- 1. Enhanced capacity to address invasive plants through growth and coordination.
- 2. Take on big picture projects that may not otherwise be addressed.
- 3. Represent an important region in national discussions.

#### National Assn. of EPPCs

- Preparing position statements and strategy in advance of NIWAW.
  - Federal WMA funding
  - S.1288 for NPS collaboration
- Advocacy for enhanced biocontrol development budgets.
- "Weeds Across Borders" international cooperation.

## Keys

- Strong Board of Directors:
  - Broad representation
  - Energy, experience, vision
  - Funding connections
- Staff:
  - Committed to bootstrapping
  - Ability to wear lots of different hats
- Sponsor organization can help
